May 24, 2005**

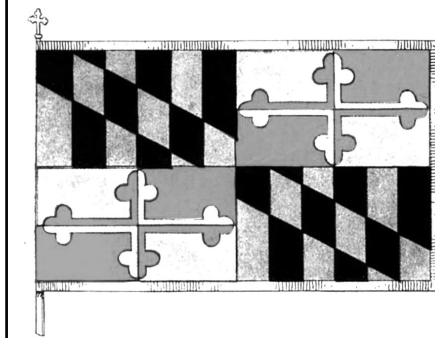

The Wheaton Redevelopment Program and the Mid-County Regional Services Center will hold the meeting at the Gilchrist Center, 11319 Elkin Street, Wheaton, Maryland, from 6:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m.

The meeting will be in two parts. The first part of the event will be a "trade fair" for various county departments, agencies, and project representatives where the public can ask questions and receive information about the redevelopment program, small business improvement programs, permitting process, and other services available to both business and residents.

The second portion of the meeting will be an opportunity for County staff to highlight several of the County Executive's recommendations for implementing the Wheaton Public Safety Audit Report and the Wheaton redevelopment efforts to date. We will continue

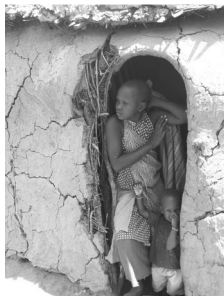

Proposed Cuts, Your Input Required!

Deep cuts in the property tax (\$70 million worth) would knock out any "new" requests. Specifically some of the proposed cuts are:

Police: Gang Prevention unit (\$597,900) which would have at least one officer assigned to each police District); the Chief's new staffing plan which would add **6 additional officers to Wheaton (to form a dedicated CBD unit).**

Park and Planning: **returning trash cans in the parks.**

Housing programs: the Council has already cut the biggest source of affordable housing funds

DED: **Minority/Small business incubator (slated for the Long Branch, Silver Spring or Wheaton communities); minority business advisor (to help expand and strengthen the minority business programs and**

activities in the County); **small business reserve fund (\$310,000)--which is used to help small business, like those in Silver Spring, Wheaton, and Long Branch to expand.**

Montgomery College: **Full funding of budget request to maintain lower tuition rates, etc.**

These are important issues. People should contact the full council and especially the five members of Council who are most interested in making the deepest cuts:

Several of these initiatives we as a Chamber have testified for are in

trouble at the Council-specifically:

- 1.. Trash cans back in the parks
- 2.. Public Safety for Wheaton. includes dedicated CBD police unit (6 officers and a sergeant) and additional members for the Safe Team (red shirts).

Make your voices heard and notify other people as well. In Wheaton, it's urgent for the business community, both Chamber and individual owners, to speak out.

Chamber Member Builds Houses in Africa

February 23 through March 8th, Chamber Member Larry White (also on the Board and you might know of him as the Chair of the Membership Committee) joined with 13 other people to help construct two houses in Kiisi, Kenya. The project was under the auspices of Habitat for Humanity in Kenya and was sponsored in part by the First Baptist Church of Wheaton, where Larry serves as an associate pastor.

Habitat for Humanity is an international organization that is dedicated to providing low cost housing for the working poor. In Kenya a Habitat home is a three-room structure that provides two bedrooms and a room for the family to gather. It is a simple mud brick structure with a tin roof. There is no kitchen since all cooking is done outdoors and bathroom facilities are also external to the main house. The Habitat home is much more desirable than the dung and mud structures these families currently live in.

While working in Kiisi, the team lived in rather primitive conditions and worked without the benefit of the power tools we are so accustomed to here in the U.S. Nevertheless, significant progress was made on two Kenya homes

the time they were there. The homeowners also worked along side the team.

Larry says, "The most important accomplishment was not the actual construction of the homes, but rather it was the building of the relationships in the community." Their presence strengthens the standing of Habitat for Humanity as an organization. Kiisi is an eight-hour drive from Nairobi, the Kenyan capital, and is rather isolated from the stronger influence of westernization that is found in Nairobi. Many of the people in Kiisi met Americans for the first time as the Habitat team worked in their village.

To see the team live much like they live and to do hard work was something that took them by surprise. The last day that the team was there ended with a party. The village chief and other local leaders honored the team with a celebration that included many speeches expressing deep gratitude. The youth performed songs and dances of the region and everyone enjoyed a feast made from roasted goat.

Larry desires to return next year and to lead a team of folks from Wheaton back and continue to build houses and
