## Cloud Computing and e-commerce for Small Businesses

Dr. Daniel Salcedo, Founder & CEO of OpenEntry.com, gave an informative presentation for the November 16 Chamber breakfast mixer, held at the Brookside Gardens Visitors Center Auditorium. Dan discussed cloud computing, where major corporations offer free or low cost services that used to run on personal computers. He also discussed



e-commerce initiatives on business networks, and showed how more W&K Chamber members can create their own free e-commerce catalogs.

Cloud computing offers off-site IT management systems

that streamline the storage and access of a business' information, applications, or data – all while saving time, money, and resources. A company can communicate, be able to access

data immediately, and maintain customer service. Some Cloud Computing providers are Google, iCloud, SugarSync, Dropbox, Windows Live Skydrive, Salesforce, Microsoft and SharePoint.



When the World Wide Web first appeared in the early 1990's, people looked to its prospects for leveling the playing field for the little guy. However e-commerce turned out to be



tricky and expensive, so many small businesses have not taken advantage of its power. Moreover, those that did manage to build their own online catalog found that buyers had difficulty finding it

## Montgomery County's Carryout Bag Law: The Basics for Retailers

Effective January 1, 2012, all retail establishments in the County that sell goods and provide their customers a paper or plastic carryout bag to carry purchases out of the store are required to charge 5 cents per bag. Customers will not be charged if they use their own bag to carry purchases out of the store.

Retail establishments include all stores, convenience stores, service stations, supermarkets, department stores, permanent booths and any other sales outlet where a customer can buy goods.

The bag law also applies to purchases made over the phone/Internet/fax when the customer is having the purchase(s) delivered in a carryout bag provided by the store.

Retailers retain 1 cent out of every 5 cents collected per bag.

### **The following bags are exempt under the law:**

- Bags used to hold prescription drug(s);
- Bags sold for initial use as yard waste bags, pet waste bags, garbage bags, dry cleaning bags, or newspaper bags;
- Bags provided by a seasonal stand or street fair stall, such as a farmer's market, yard sale, or "occasional retailer" (defined in the law as "... a retail establishment that engages in the retail sale of goods no more than six days in any calendar year);

- Bags used to package a bulk item or to contain or wrap a perishable item; and

- A paper bag that a restaurant gives a customer to take prepared or leftover food or drink from the restaurant.

A retail establishment must record on the customer's transaction receipt the number of carryout bags that were provided to the customer and the total amount charge levied at a rate of 5 cents per bag.

- On or before the 25th day of each month, each retail establishment must remit the full amount of the charges collected for all carryout bags provided to a customer during the previous month, at a rate of 4 cents per bag. Retailers are required to pay only after their cumulative revenue from bags exceeds \$100 (at least 2,500 bags paid for by customers).

- A secure website will be set up for submission of the tax. Information required for payment is the total number of bags paid for by customers and retailers' identity facts.

- Retailers may voluntarily provide customers a credit, customarily recorded on the purchase receipt, for any bags which customers bring to the store to carry their purchases. The law does not require that retailers provide a customer credit program.

- Under the law, retailers must charge customers for bags and may not provide a store credit to cover the bag tax amount.

- The money collected from the carryout bag law will go into the County's Water Quality Protection Charge fund which finances County watershed protection activities, including litter control and stormwater pollution control.


among the millions of websites on the Internet, and if they did find it, they might not trust it.

In the last few years, social networking services have revolutionized the way people connect to communities and form opinions. A proliferation of devices ranging from mobile phones to netbooks to tablets has greatly expanded the hardware choices. This is all good news to small business owners who understand how to make the most of these exciting new opportunities.

With OpenEntry.com small businesses and organizations can create their own e-commerce catalog, and keep 100% of the price (minus a couple of % to PayPal). Here is a history of OpenEntry, and Dan's work:



OpenEntry (www.OpenEntry.com) is an initiative of PEOPLink, a non-profit organization founded in 1994 by Dr. Daniel Salcedo. PEOPLink (www.peoplink.org) has the mission of helping artisans and small and medium enterprises (SMEs) in developing countries benefit from the exciting

new opportunities opened up by the Internet. PEOPLink began as an on-line version of Pueblo to People, a well-known mail order catalog founded in 1978 by Dan and

his wife, with the purpose of using international trade to benefit the poor majorities of people in Central America.

PEOPLink launched the first global fair trade on-line catalog and began selling products from grass roots producers around the world. Dan realized that rather than marketing the products of artisan producers, it made more development sense to build tools that empower them to create and maintain their own e-commerce catalogs. This enables producers to bypass the chain of middlemen that normally pay them no more

than 10% of the final retail price. In 1997, PEOPLink began distributing digital cameras to producer groups and then built on-line training modules guiding them to edit the images.

In 1999, Dan realized the need for a tool to enable

SMEs in building their own transactional catalogs and also to make it easy for SME networks to aggregate their members' individual catalogs into a branded market capable of generating the necessary visibility and credibility. He wrote out the functional specifications for the CatGen (for "catalog generator") e-commerce platform and Jeff Skoll, then Vice President for Strategic Planning at eBay, helped launch it with a generous personal donation.


Oracle, impressed that CatGen placed database-based e-commerce in the hands of SMEs worldwide, donated a full suite of its latest software. Many other donors including the World Bank, USAID, the InterAmerican Development Bank, Kellogg Foundation also supported the effort.

CatGen enlisted developers (based in Armenia, Ukraine, Siberia, India, Ecuador, Nepal, Ireland, and USA) to build a powerful e-commerce platform and guided thousands of SMEs in 44 of the poorest countries to participate.



While CatGen was originally designed for the worldwide network of fair trade producers members of the World Fair Trade Organization, as it grew in power and functionality, commercial business networks (chambers of commerce, trade promotion organizations, industry associations) found they also needed network markets.

CatGen won the Global IT Excellence Award for Digital Opportunity by the World Information Technology and Services Alliance, and also established alliances with a wide range of public and private institutions including eBay, PayPal, US Council on International Business, Global Information Infrastructure Commission, United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization, and



IBM's Global Innovation Outlook for Africa.

Yet, by mid-2008, CatGen was facing many of the difficulties typical of small "dot-coms" – that managing one's own server was complicated and costly. Facing

serious financial difficulties as a non-profit without access to venture capital, Dan decided in late 2008 to relaunch CatGen using the latest "cloud computing" technology. The catalog generator now uses Google tools and servers while the network market builder runs on Amazon's EC2 Cloud Computing Facility. In January 2009, it was relaunched with the more professional name OpenEntry.com.

In June 2009 OpenEntry signed a partnership agreement with the World Chambers Network of the International Chamber of Commerce to build a global marketplace and promote network markets throughout its 12,000 member chambers representing 40 million businesses worldwide.
